Ostravané round the World

I have had a small Czech lesson and learned that the collective word for people who live in Ostrava is Ostravané or Ostravaci if they are all men or Ostrávački if they are all women (I hope all the accents are in the right place), so we shall try and be grammatically correct in future.

In Newsletter #7, we mentioned Gita Thieberger who now lives in Kangaroo Valley, New South Wales, Australia. To complete the circle of the globe, I am delighted to introduce the first (we think) Ostravačka in Iceland! Ruth Berger (geb. Folkartová) went to visit her new great-granddaughter, born in Iceland at the end of October. Mazal Tov to all the family!

Betty Barton's late husband was **Fred (Alfred) Buchsbaum** whose father, Josef, ran a ladies hairdressing salon in Ostrava which, in 1924, had the first machine to do permanent waving;



Josef and Fred came to England in 1939 as soon as the Germans invaded Ostrava, leaving everything behind. Fred ultimately bought a business making feather hats and one of them was worn by HM Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother. Here is Betty in December 2009, wearing one of them:



Jűrgen Schwiening is not from Ostrava nor, indeed, from the Czech Republic He writes;

We met **Kate Fielding**, **née Lichtenstern**, for the first time a few years ago at an AJR (Association of Jewish Refugees) lunch at our house here in Market Bosworth. Käthe/Kate was born in Vienna in 1910, the daughter of Viktor Lichtenstern (born in M-Ostrau) and Olga Loew (born in Buchlowitz). As we got to know Kate better we learnt about her family and her life in Vienna. I began to do some research for Kate. Among other things I made contact

with the present headmistress of the Gymnasium that Kate had attended. Frau Pick was so kind to retrieve some documents relating to Kate's time there from the school archive. All documents, there were of course only copies in the first place, were passed on to Kate. After her death earlier this year, they went to her daughters Marian and Evelyn. I have also made contact with Dorit Lichtenstern. When I saw the family tree I noticed that several members of the family were shown as having perished in the Holocaust. My attention focussed on Rosa Lichtenstern (born 1868) who was deported in 1942 from Theresienstadt to Treblinka, Josef Lichtenstern (born 1915 in M-Ostrau) who died in April 1945 on the death march from Schwarzheide to Theresienstadt and his wife Gertrude (born 1915) who survived Theresienstadt, Birkenau and Belsen. So far I have not found anything about her life after the war. I have yet to find out how Renee Lichtenstern (born 1929 in Ostrava), a daughter of Hans Lichtenstern and Anni is related to 'my' Lichtensterns.

Do any of you know these Lichtensterns?

Peter Gordy (geb. Goldberger) writes from the USA:

Our family situation was such that all of our important family belongings were packed in a steamer trunk forwarded to Trieste destined for Brazil. The voyage was interrupted when Italy entered the war and hence, the trunk was stolen, containing all family photo albums (and some of my toys).

Almost all our family was subsequently deported and killed by the Nazis, leaving me with almost no knowledge of my family history. I am now hoping that some of your newsletter readers might remember the Goldberger Family, Ferdinand and Helene (born Tramer), their children Heinrich (my father), Else and Herta or possibly Ferdinand's siblings, Marie, Julius, Siegmund, Gusti, Ludwig, Rudi and Anna.

In Newsletter #12 we described the recent unveiling of the new Nisko Monument in Ostrava. A similar report was published in the Review of the British Czech and Slovak Association in December. **Moshe Har-El (geb:Hans Hechter)** writes from Israel:

My father's twin brother was deported in October 1939 to Nisko and never came back. That happened a short time after we moved (I and my parents) to Prague, where we tried to find a way to leave Europe, of course without success. My father was arrested a short time later and sent to Sosnowiecz, near Katowiecz. What happened later you already know from my little book. Happy Hanuccah,

Alice Anson (geb.Gross) found some postcards and photographs when clearing up some papers, and sent them to us. Here is a photograph (1993) of their family house on the corner of Bahnhofstrasse and Maigasse, where the Gross and Adler families lived. After the war, she and her brother each received £500 for it!

Uri Meretz (März) has explained the difference between himself and Uri Meretz! There are two of them:

Uri (Jiri) Meretz is the senior among us cousins. My own full name is Uriel Meretz. Uri's (Jiri's) father, Dr. David Paul Meretz and my father Eliezer Hugo Meretz, were brothers.

Uriel sent me an article written by his Uncle David, *Juden in Ostrau* which is very interesting. Uriel writes of his Uncle:

"My uncle was not a historian, but a highly learned person and perhaps as the last president of the Czechoslovak Zionist Organization, center of which was in Ostrava, he felt an obligation to write about the town's Jewish community"

The article is a pleasant antidote to the virulently anti-semitic book by Drapala, with the same name.

We were recently introduced to Centropa, the Central Europe Center for Research and Documentation. Although they have many photographs etc from Czechoslovakia, they do not have anything from Ostrava. However, we are now in contact with them, so any enquiries about Ostrava will come to us.


Apology
